# Master of Laws in International Law

## Introduction

The specialized LLM Programme intends to inculcate the candidates with an advanced knowledge in the area of International Law; filling the dearth of legal practitioners with such expert knowledge and enhancing the career development and prospects of the students. The students upon the successful completion of this qualification will be able to gain employment as academics, legal officers in international organizations and institutes, engaged in legal practice in the area of International Law and involve in Foreign Services. The outlook for international law suggests growth, as this area of the law is expected to grow even faster than other areas. The teaching staff of the programme brings together the best legal minds in Sri Lanka which includes leading academics, practitioners and industry professionals with special expertise, as well as visiting international scholars. Students would benefit from the rich educational environment while intermingling with professionals from many backgrounds and industries, and building the specialized expertise and experience needed to gain a professional cutting edge.

Globalization brings private and public sectors closely together while enhancing the affairs between and among nations. Therefore, the demand for international lawyers has rapidly increased in the contemporary world. This development has created a place and a demand for lawyers with a Master's degree in International Law. Moreover, developing countries need lawyers to assist in their legal transformations and international and regional organizations to interpret their Charters and International Law.

## Objectives

The breadth of the programme gives students an opportunity to harness their legal knowledge and skills, and enhance career prospects for the

purpose of attaining their personal and professional goals. Further,

- a. To provide an advanced knowledge and perception of the underpinnings of different fields of International Law and the skills required in practice.
- b. To develop critical awareness and provide practical solutions to the types of problems commonly encountered in the practice of International Law.
- c. To inculcate research skills at postgraduate level deemed appropriate to careers involving different fields of International Law.
- d. To provide the foundation for progression to doctoral level study in International Law.
- e. To enhance attitudes, values, ethics, and communication skills to create an expert in the field of International Law.

## Intended Learning Outcomes

At the end of the Master of Laws in International Law, a student will be able to:

- a. Demonstrate critical awareness of current issues in International Law and be able to apply techniques relevant to profession/ area of specialization.
- b. Should be able to deal with complex issues systematically and creatively and make sound judgments and communicate decisions clearly to specialist and non-specialist groups.
- c. Should demonstrate self-direction and originality in tackling and solving problems and be able to plan and implement tasks at professional manner.



## Eligibility Criteria

A person may be eligible for admission to the Degree Programme provided he/she meets the following criteria;

- i. A Legal Officer in the Armed Forces, the Police or the Public/Private sector, or an independent practitioner; and
- ii. Possesses any of the following qualifications;
  - a. A Degree in Law with a 1st class/ 2nd class upper division; or
  - b. A Degree in Law with a 2nd class lower division and with 2 years professional experience, or
  - c. A Degree in Law without a class and with 3 years professional experience, or
  - d. An Attorney at Law with a minimum of 5 years professional experience.

## Programme Structure

The Degree Programme shall be considered as full-time study programme with a research component of 15 credits and 12 modules of 45 credits (Total - 60) offered in 04 semesters. The duration of the Degree Programme shall be two (02) academic years (24 months). Lectures will be held on weekends according to the schedule provided by the Faculty of Law other than public holidays from 0830 hrs to 1730 hrs. The medium of instruction and evaluation of the Degree Programme is English.

## Continuous Assessments

Instructions for Submission of Continuous Assessments

- a. FGS expects the highest professional, academic and scholarly standards in student assignments. Therefore, haphazard, incomplete or hurried assignments will not qualify for marking.
- b. Assignments call for a significant degree of knowledge, analysis and critique. FGS expects the students to work hard, consider these assignments seriously and concentrate on them. Assignments are potentially powerful learning resources for communication.
- c. Continuous Assessment shall be a library-based research containing 4000 words, conducted by the Candidate. Similarity level of the Continuous Assessment shall be below 20%.
- d. The Candidate shall be required to fulfill both the Continuous Assessment and the End Semester Examination in order to complete each subject module.
- e. There are no extensions on assignment submission dates. Students are responsible for submitting their assignments on due date.

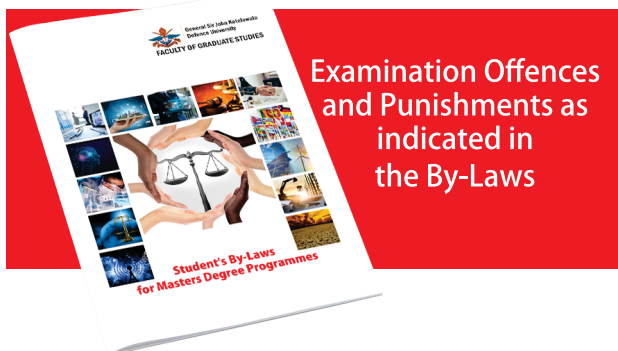

## Master of Laws in International Law

### Course Syllabus

The programme contains 12 compulsory subject modules and a dissertation on guided research. The medium of instruction and evaluation of the Degree Programme shall be English. Each subject module shall carry a maximum of 100 marks. Performance of the candidate in each module shall be evaluated by means of a Continuous Assessment and an End Semester Examination. Continuous Assessment shall be a library-based research containing 4000 words, conducted by the Candidate. Similarity level of the Continuous Assessment shall be below 20%. The Candidate shall be required to fulfil both the Continuous Assessment and the End Semester Examination in order to complete each subject module. A candidate is also required to produce a dissertation which shall be a well-researched document of high academic standard of 25000 words. A Candidate shall defend both his research proposal and the Dissertation in front of an Evaluation Panel.
